# History of National Volunteer Week

This year marks the 30th annual celebration of National Volunteer Week which began when President Richard Nixon signed an executive order establishing the week as an annual celebration of volunteerism in 1974. Every U.S. President since then has signed a proclamation promoting National Volunteer Week.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, during the past year, (September, 2002 through September, 2004) 63.8 million people volunteered in some capacity — up from 59.8 million for the similar period ended in September 2002. The volunteer rate grew to 28.8 percent, up from 27.4 percent.

According to Independent Sector's 2001 Giving and Volunteering Survey, 83.9 million American adults over age 21 volunteered 3.6 hours per week in 2000, this was the equivalent of over 9 million full-time employees at a total assigned dollar value of \$239 billion.

# Nonprofit Resource & Training Center Celebrates a Decade of Service, 1994-2004

For the last decade, the United Way of the Capital Area's Nonprofit Resource and Training Center has provided resources, referrals, and training to nonprofit organizations throughout the greater Hartford area and in Windham and New Britain. The Resource Center has extensive information and online data on nonprofit management and governance, fundraising, what makes a good board, and volunteerism.

Since it began operation in 1994, hundreds of representatives of local agencies have visited, called, logged on to the web site and attended training sessions. Resource Center materials also are available at the Windham and New Britain/Berlin offices to accommodate organizations closer to those locations. Additionally, a number of books are on permanent loan to the Hartford Public Library reference department so that individuals who cannot come in during traditional work hours have access to the information.

The Resource Center offers Board Excellence training sessions free of charge several times a year. In the past 5 years, more than 1700 people have taken the training. In collaboration with Leadership Greater Hartford, the Resource Center also administers the Community Leadership Board Bank, a database of trained and motivated individuals (many with business skills) who wish to serve on nonprofit boards. Approximately 45 agencies a year make requests to the Board Bank.
